Cambridge Press will publish their work next year in a book that early reviewers say is expected to become the definitive guide on the subject for the next 50 years.

He is also the co-author of *Energy Manual: Sustainable Architecture*, published by Birkhauser Basel.

Professor of Art History and Chair of the Department of Art History, UCLA, Los Angeles

“Defining a Public Realm: Conflict, Imagination, and Demeanor in the Antebellum American City”

Dell Upton is a Professor of Architectural History and Chair of the Department of Art History at UCLA. His interests include the history of architecture, cities, and material culture and the ways that cultural, social, aesthetic, and cognitive theories can enrich the study of architectural history. The author of *Another City: Urban Life and Urban Spaces in the New American Republic* (2008), *Holy Things and Profane: Anglican Parish Churches in Colonial Virginia* (1986), and *Madaline: Love and Survival in Antebellum New Orleans* (1996), Professor Upton is working on a world history of architecture and a study of civil-rights monuments and urban politics in the American South.
