Jewish-Christian relations has been marked with extraordinary transition. For centuries the relationship was strained as Christianity held the Jews collectively responsible for the crucifixion of Jesus of Nazareth. As the centuries progress, the relationship began to improve particularly with the introduction in 1965 of *Nostra Aetate* (In Our Time). In this series we will review the relationship between Jews and Christians in the past and present.

Presenter: Tim Crain is Adjunct Assistant Professor and Jewish Studies Outreach Coordinator at UWM. Tim received his B.A. from Marquette University where he triple-majored in philosophy, political science and history. He received his M.A. from Marquette University in modern European history and earned his Ph.D. in modern British, Irish and Jewish history at Arizona State University.

The importance of stars as a basic building block of life will be discussed, as well how space and astronomy can be easily accessible to everyone, even under city lights. Besides the four classroom sessions, this course will include one planetarium visit on a Friday night and one star-gazing session on a Wednesday night, dates TBA.

Presenter: **Kathy Brehmer** retired as the Manager of Budget for the Milwaukee Area Technical College in 2009. Since then she has served on the Leadership and Development Committee of Osher, tutored math for GED students and has enjoyed auditing classes at UWM through the 60+ audit program. She became interested in astronomy in the 1970's because of the space program.

Oceanography II

Discuss a variety of characteristics of the oceans including the structure of the seafloor, sediments on the seafloor, waves, tides, currents, dynamics of the beach environment, variations in the temperature and salinity, and the propagation of sound energy in the water. Though this course is a continuation of "Introduction to the World's Oceans", enrollment in the previous course is not required.

Presenter: Prof. **Keith A. Sverdrup** joined the faculty in the UWM Department of Geosciences in 1983. He received his B.S. in Geophysics from the University of Minnesota and his Ph.D. in Earth Science (seismology) from the Scripps Institute of Oceanography at the University of California-San Diego. He is principal author of two oceanography textbooks that are used at colleges and universities across the country and internationally.

George Eliot's *Middlemarch*

One of the great novels of the 19th Century, *Middlemarch*, like its contemporary *War & Peace*, can fairly be described as a novel about “everything”—public issues of politics, economics, class, education, medical care, aesthetics, and religious dogma as well as private issues of vocation, avocation, familial loyalty, love and sex. Eliot’s first audience had the luxury of reading *Middlemarch* over a year, from December 1871 to December 1872, as it was published in eight installments. We will read and discuss what we can in six weekly sessions, recognizing that this masterpiece richly rewards second and third readings.

Presenter: **Marilyn Johnson** worked as a municipal bond trader for twenty years. After leaving the financial industry, she worked with her husband to amass a large collection of historic photographs, the bulk of which is now part of the Milwaukee County Historical Society’s photo archive. She also delivered a series of photo-lectures entitled *Remembering Milwaukee*.



The Music of World War II

World War II was rich inspiration for popular music. There were songs about missed loved ones, of loneliness and pledges of faithfulness. There were songs about heroes and songs that derided the enemy. There were songs that made fun of military life and about the challenges of the home front.

What song was sometimes referred to as the “British ‘White Christmas’”? What German song became a hit with the Allied troops as well as with the German troops for whom it was intended? What official song of an American military branch was a result of a public competition?

We will look at songs, their composers and performers. We’ll look at the stories behind the songs. We will listen to many songs and there will be an opportunity for participants to take recordings home for listening.

Presenter: **Earl Grow** is a retired professor who taught for 30 years at UW-Milwaukee where he created the History of Broadcasting course.

Mobile Robots—A Technology On the Move

This course includes an introduction to mobile robots including current applications, examples and basic technologies. There will be description and illustration of components of mobile robots with emphasis on critical technologies, as well as the different types of mobile robots and some specifics of each, including LEGO NXT, Roomba, humanoid, hexpod and others. In each class session one or more examples of the robots discussed are available for student observation and testing; in the third and fourth classes students have the opportunity to operate robot examples and try some reprogramming.

Presenter: Dennis Miller worked at Johnson Controls for 35 years as an engineer and engineering manager. He retired in 2007 and since then has worked on the development of mobile robots both for fun and interest as a basis for teaching technology to middle and high school students. Dennis has taught courses on computer aided design, robotics, software and related topics through the Marquette University Engineering Outreach Program as well as for a number of organizations. He has been and continues to be a mentor for FIRST Robotics Competition teams.

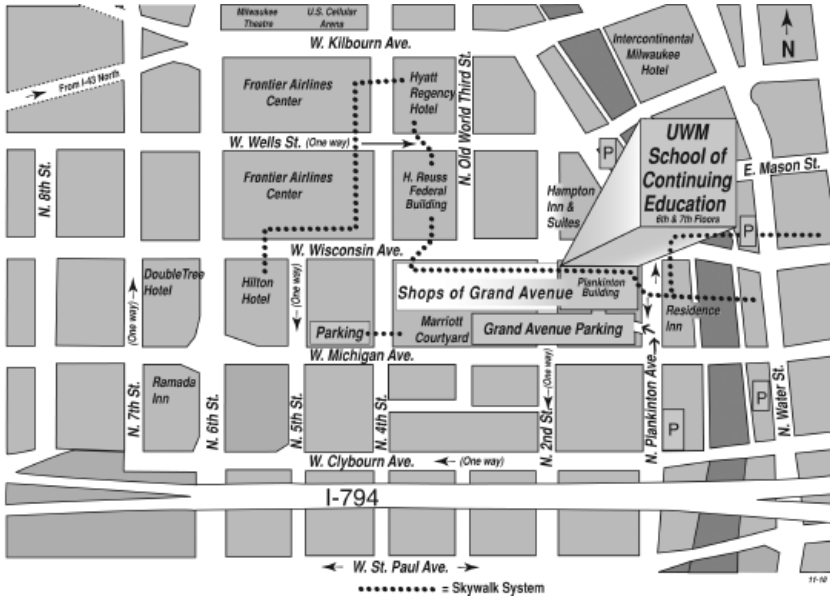

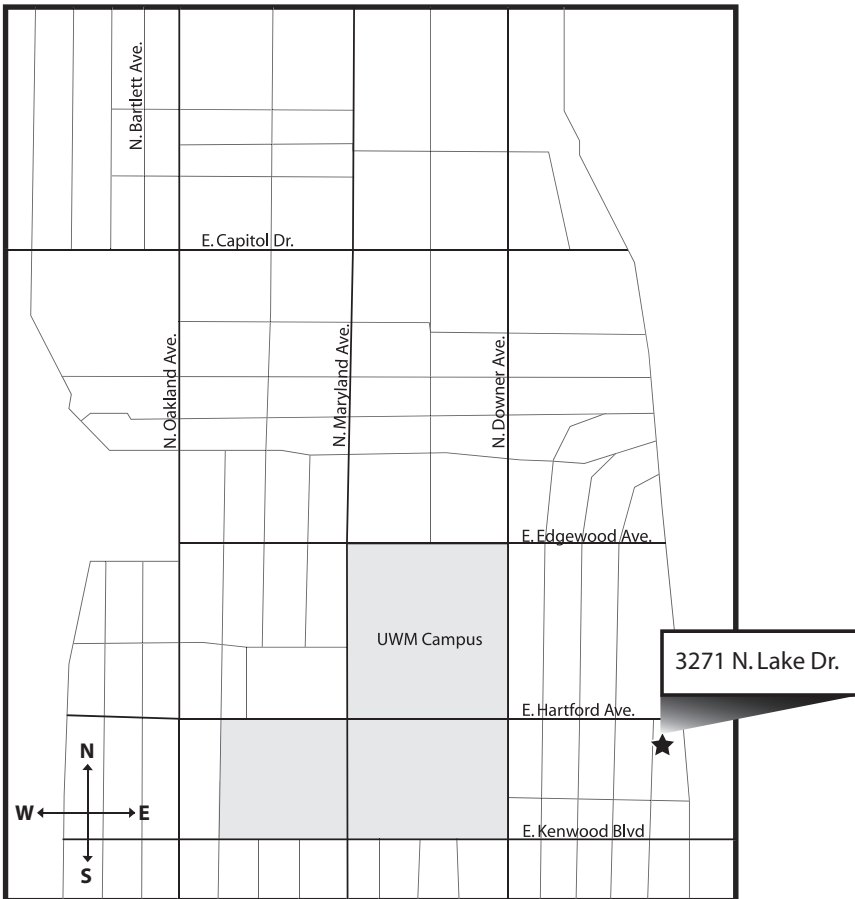
