UWM BACCALAUREATE DEGREE:

BACHELOR OF SOCIAL WORK (B.S.W.)

RATIONAL: WCTC offers a two-year degree program designed to prepare students for entry-level positions in human services. The curriculum has a strong social science base, and combines theory and practical experience in developing skills necessary to work within the human service field, particularly in addiction, developmental disabilities or mental health issues. The University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee baccalaureate degree program in social work seeks to prepare students for employment in the human service professions by providing them with an orientation to the values and ethics of the profession of social work as well as knowledge of the bio-psycho-social variables that effect individual development and behavior. A bachelor's degree is becoming increasingly mandatory for those people who wish to be employed as licensed, professional social workers.

Many students in the greater Milwaukee area are interested in careers in the human service profession, but find, once they have completed a two-year degree, that many professional human service positions require a four-year degree, usually a BSW. This articulation agreement would create a vehicle that would facilitate transfer from WCTC to UW-Milwaukee for those students who complete the Human Service program at WCTC, and reflects changes made in the WCTC curriculum.

Students earning the Human Services Associate degree from WCTC will be able to transfer credits and fulfill the requirements specified below if they complete the social work program at UWM.

CONDITIONS: The UW-Milwaukee baccalaureate candidate must also meet the General Education Requirements and the Cultural Diversity requirement of the University.

Program-to-program transfer courses/credits are accepted only for the program degree specified in this agreement. A change of major/degree/program invalidates these courses/credits for transfer unless they are approved within some other Program-to-Program Articulation Agreement for a different major/degree/program at UW-Milwaukee.

Course equivalencies in this articulation agreement are subject to change in the event that the course curricula of either institution undergo revision.

WCTC students must have an Associate Degree in Human Service earned after May 2004. Coursework must have been taken since Fall 2002-2003.
