## **Archival Collections**

Alvarez Cuauhtémoc, Juan.

**Photographic Collection of El Movimiento in Milwaukee's Latino Community, 1968-1971.**

*UWM Manuscript Collection 222*

Collection consists of 33 photographs documenting the Latino civil rights movement in Milwaukee from the late 1960s through the 1970s. The photos document several aspects of El Movimiento ("The Movement" in English) including rallies, hearings, artworks, the Brown Berets, key individuals (including Cesar Chavez and Father Groppi), and public demonstrations in both Milwaukee and Madison. The photos were intended for use in the political community newspaper *La Guardia*, and were given to Juan Alvarez by Charlie Quesada (former editor of *La Guardia*) in the mid 1970s. Most of the photographs were taken by Chuck Miller. Collection also includes the October, 1969, issue of *La Guardia*, and three newspaper clippings from *Soul City Times* showing 1970 welfare demonstrations.

**Baez, Tony.**

**Papers, 1968-1979.**

*Milwaukee Manuscript Collection 8*

Papers of a Puerto Rican activist and leader of Milwaukee's Latin community from 1970 to 1979. Baez held a number of positions in the areas of bilingual/bicultural education, juvenile delinquency, and curriculum development. The collection illustrates his work with several agencies, among them, the Advocate Education Program-Teacher Corps for Corrections-Milwaukee, the Community Independent Learning Program, the Bicultural Education, and the Midwest National-Origin Desegregation-Assistance Center of the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee.

**Milwaukee Journal Stations.  
Collection, 1922-1997.**

Footage includes: Jesus Salas leading a march to Madison in August 1966; Salas talking about migrant workers rights' in August 1967; Latino students taking over the Chancellor's office at UWM in August 1970; a protest outside the offices of Concentrated Employment Program on the south side of Milwaukee in June 1969; and Cuban refugees in Milwaukee June 1962.

**Pokorny, Gary.**

**The History of Hispanic ministry in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee, 1985.**

*Milwaukee Small Collection 206*

Research paper by Pokorny, a student at St. Francis Seminary in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, describing the response within the Catholic Church's Archdiocese of Milwaukee to the growth of the Mexican American, Puerto Rican, Cuban, and migrant worker communities in southeastern Wisconsin from the 1920s to 1985. Based mainly on newspaper accounts and on information solicited from past and current Church workers, the paper discusses activities in individual parishes as well as social initiatives (the Migrant Worker Program, the Spanish Center in Milwaukee, the Racine Spanish Center, the Hispanic Apostolate), and events such as the creation of Cristo Rey Parish.

**United Migrant Opportunities Services.**

**Records, 1974-1985.**

Miscellaneous records of a Milwaukee organization formed to aid migrant workers resettle into other work and to assist them in adjusting to nonmigratory life. Includes a planning document, a summary of United Migrant Opportunities Services (UMOS) projects, a project budget, publications including UMOS' 20th anniversary album, notes, and an annual report for 1984.

**University of Wisconsin--Milwaukee. Board of Visitors.**

**Records, 1977-1988.**

The records document the activities of the Board of Visitors and the committees it appointed, to study and advise the University of Wisconsin--Milwaukee (UWM) administration on many questions regarding the university. Minutes, annual reports, correspondence, and research reports identify issues that the Board studied, such as recruitment and retention of minority students, collective bargaining, and relations with the students, the public, and the business community. The records also contain information regarding the creation of the Board of Visitors, the nomination of members, biographies of the Board members, and bylaws.

**University of Wisconsin--Milwaukee. Dept. of Enrollment Services.  
Records, 1967-1991.**

Records of the Dept. of Enrollment Services and its sub-units, the Office of the Registrar and the Admissions Office. The collection includes annual reports and planning documents, enrollment statistics, and surveys. The records also document the recruitment of minorities and high school students, and student admission and retention.

**University of Wisconsin--Milwaukee. Division of Urban Outreach.  
Records, 1972-1984.**

The collection contains miscellaneous records of an office which facilitated university efforts to apply research and knowledge to the solution of urban problems. Included are files on curriculum, workshops, committee minutes, conferences, and project reports.

**University of Wisconsin--Milwaukee. Equal Opportunity Office.  
Records, 1971-1987.**

The collection documents affirmative action planning at the University of Wisconsin--Milwaukee (UWM). The records largely consist of affirmative action plans, goals and timetables, and reports. Recruitment of minorities and women was a priority for the Equal Opportunity Office (EOO), and the collection has a large amount of materials on their availability and recruiting. The program manual and files on policies and guidelines detail legislation and procedures for handling gender and racial discrimination cases, filing grievances, and academic staff hiring.

**University of Wisconsin--Milwaukee. Institute of Human Relations.  
Records, 1964-1968.**

*UWM Archival Collection 106*

The Institute studied minority problems, social conflict, and integration of students at UWM. Included in the collection are the criteria in the search for a director. The minutes include a roster and summary of committee activities. The correspondence documents scholarship opportunities, financial support for the Institute, a student exchange program between UWM and southern schools, and the lack of inner city students at UWM. The collection documents conferences sponsored by the Institute, newspaper clippings regarding integration, resolutions to equalize educational opportunities and a report of Project Destiny, an Upward Bound program, supported by the Institute of Human Relations.

**University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, Office of the Chancellor.  
Records, 1943-1992.**

*UWM Archival Collection 46*

The chancellor is the chief administrative officer for the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee campus, and the collection documents the chancellor's responsibility for overseeing UWM's administrative offices, center, colleges, and school. The records concern topics such as accreditation, general policy issues, funding, new courses, organizational structure, plans for expansion, staffing, and other administrative affairs.

**University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. Photographic Services.  
Records, 1989-2003.**

*UWM Archival Collection 6*

Photographs, negatives and slides were usually taken by the staff at Photographic Services or outside professional photographers. A smaller number of the photographs were taken by the staff of the *Echo Weekly* (1919-1951), *Wisconsin State Times* (1951-1956), and the *UWM Post* (1956-present). The images, mostly in black and white, document the administration, student activities, athletic competition, buildings, and activities of the Milwaukee Downer College, the Milwaukee Normal School, the Wisconsin State Teacher's College, and the University of Wisconsin--Milwaukee.

**University of Wisconsin--Milwaukee. Spanish Speaking Outreach Institute.  
Records, 1970-1989.**

*UWM Archival Collection 116*

Miscellaneous records and publications from the Spanish Speaking Outreach Institute dating from its 1970 formation to 1989. This collection consists mainly of correspondence from the advisory committee, reports, meeting minutes, and publications including newsletters and brochures. These records document staff and budget issues, community programs, program evaluations, and statistics and special problems of Hispanic students at the University of Wisconsin--Milwaukee.

**University of Wisconsin--Milwaukee. Student Affairs. Office of the Assistant Chancellor.  
Records, 1935-1996.**

*UWM Archival Collection 58*

Records of the Assistant Chancellor's office, and its predecessors, the Dean of Student Affairs and Assistant Chancellor for Student Services and Special Programs. The majority of the collection consists of the files concerning the operations of ad hoc and standing committees, departments and programs within Student Affairs, including Admissions and Records, the Experimental Program in Higher Education, Financial Aid, High School and College Relations, Housing, International Scholars, Learning Skills, Placement and Career Development, Registration and Records, and Student Health.

**University of Wisconsin--Milwaukee. Office of the Dean of Students.  
Records, 1915-[ongoing].**

The collection largely consists of files of UWM student organizations, including fraternities and sororities, student government, and a wide variety of ethnic, political, professional, religious, and social groups. The most extensive files exist for campus fraternities and sororities, and Vietnam-era protest groups. Files also exist for a number of student groups for African Americans, Hispanics, and women.

**West End Community Association (Milwaukee, Wis.). Office of the Executive Director.  
Records, 1972-1997.**

*UWM Manuscript Collection 120*

Records of one of Milwaukee's oldest neighborhood groups that document its involvement in economic, business, and community development, residential improvement, and the effort to curb illegal liquor consumption and prostitution in Milwaukee. The West End Community Association, originally founded in July 1972 as a Latino organization, was established to work toward the economic, educational, and recreational betterment of the community and of the individuals within the neighborhood.
